What did you do after residency and what are you doing now?

After residency, I spent a year as the 7800 nocturnist (Pulm Transplant and Advanced Lung Disease), before moving to northern Ghana for two years to help establish a new academic partnership between the AMPATH Consortium and a teaching hospital and medical school in northern Ghana. In this role, I

helped establish new partnerships, as well as clinical, educational, and research programs particularly around simulation education, chronic

disease management, and adolescent mental health.

In my second year in Ghana, I also received a Fogarty Research Fellowship to support my mental health research, and decided to pursue a career as a physician researcher. Most recently, I returned to the US earlier this year and started a faculty position at the University of Chicago (and

Clinically, I see med-peds patients as a primary care physician (precepting residents and my own clinic), and still get to do a few weeks of hospital medicine a year. I'm also continuing my research in Ghana on improving chronic disease care and outcomes and adolescent mental health.

What brings you the most joy during your work days and in your free time?






