What attracted you to Duke Med-Peds and/or Durham?

Alum Highlight Continued... What did you do after residency and what are you doing now?

After residency, I moved to Houston to complete a fellowship in pediatric cardiology at Texas Children's Hospital. I then returned to Duke for a second fellowship as the inaugural Thomas Anstrom Fellow in Adult Congenital Heart Disease (ACHD). After completing training, I was recruited to Phoenix Children's Hospital (by fellow Duke Med-Peds alum Wayne Franklin, MD, MBA), where I now serve as Director of the Stephen C. Grout Adult Congenital Heart Disease Program.

In addition to my clinical work, I spend much of my time focused on ACHD education and advocacy efforts through the American College of Cardiology (ACC). I currently serve on the Leadership Council for the ACC's Adult Congenital and Pediatric Cardiology Section and co-chair the ACHD Work Groups and the ACHD Quality, Advocacy, and Access to Care Task Force.

Looking back to where you are now, what were the most important aspects of your Duke Med-Peds Residency experience that helped prepare you for your career?

Duke gave me the foundation I needed to care for incredibly complex patients—something that's at the heart of my work in adult congenital cardiology. The training pushed me to think critically, multitask effectively, and manage competing priorities—skills that are essential in a field where you're constantly navigating both pediatric and adult medicine. In ACHD, we often serve as the primary care provider for our patients, so having a strong general medicine background has been absolutely invaluable.

From your perspective, what can we do as a Med-Peds community to continue to advocate for quality health care for our patients and their families?

We're practicing in a time when reputable science and evidence-based medicine are increasingly under threat. We have a responsibility not only to provide excellent care but also to educate our patients and families so they can make informed decisions in an often confusing landscape.

At Duke, I felt very fortunate to care for a large population of patients from lower socioeconomic backgrounds. With Medicaid and other public programs increasingly under threat, it is critical that we use our voices to advocate for the most vulnerable members of our society and their right to affordable, equitable, and high-quality healthcare.

What brings you the most joy during at work and in your free time? What are you doing to stay grounded and centered during these tumultuous times?

I'm incredibly lucky to have a supportive wife who helps keep me grounded, and we're fortunate to live in a beautiful part of the country with amazing weather and scenery. We spend a lot of time outdoors biking, hiking, and hanging out with our dogs. And yes, for those who knew me during residency, I'm still baking!

Any words of wisdom for current trainees?

These are challenging times just to exist—so be kind to yourselves and take care of those around you. Make the most of your time at Duke by taking advantage of every opportunity to learn and grow, both clinically and personally. The relationships you build—with mentors, faculty, and especially your coresidents—will carry forward throughout your career.






